This led to me falling away from social get-togethers, friends and others, which caused a chain-reaction causing even more bitterness in my life. In retrospect, I never mourned for this person's passing; instead I just rushed into busying myself. This was because I wanted a quick fix. Over time, this whole ordeal ate me up inside, and I noticed a lot of bad habits forming in my life because of it. After much time passed, I finally had to admit that this was resulting from my lack of patience in trusting in God and lack of patience in dealing with issues one step at a time.
